



# **Art Exhibition – Thursday 24 October Fondation Pierre Gianadda, Martigny**



Please join us for an excursion to Martigny to see this excellent exhibition that highlights how both Cézanne and Renoir influenced painting in the early 20th century.

The romance of Renoir, reflected in his soft caressing touch and Cézanne's order and discipline can be found side by side in this rare display gathered from private collections and loans from the Musée d'Orsay.

**Where:** The Fondation Gianadda, rue du Forum 59, 1920 Martigny. We will meet at there at 11h00 and I will book a restaurant for 13h00 for those who want to join me for lunch.

# Two-day trip to Zurich 3–4 April 2025



We will take the train to Zurich on Thursday morning, 3 April, arriving in time for lunch at a very Italian trattoria with everything *fatto in casa*.

Our nearby hotel is located in the heart of the picturesque Old Town and richly decorated with paintings by famous Swiss painters Rudolf Koller and Heinz Blum. Heidi, the hotel cow, sports the old-town Zurich panorama as a body painting and welcomes all guests.

The programme is still being developed, but will include a walk round the Old Town with its many independent

shops in pretty cobbled streets, a stroll down the popular Bahnhofstrasse, as well as a visit to more quirky areas of the city such as the arches of the old railway viaduct.

We will also visit the city's police station for an unexpected feast for the eyes and then a more racy venue where the Dada movement began at the Cabaret Voltaire.

In the afternoon we will travel down the lake (by bus or boat depending on the weather) to visit the Villa Patumbah and its

beautiful gardens. There is also an option to visit the Lindt Home of Chocolate.

The French equivalent, *faire d'une pierre deux coups*, comes from the XVI century, meaning that throwing a stone can have a ricochet on another object.

# Meet The Grapevine Printers!

It was a beautiful afternoon when I arrived with President Sue for a tour of l'Espérance, an institution devoted to the inclusion of mentally handicapped persons into meaningful society. And what a treat we had! Sébastien Bertholet, who is our contact person for the preparation and distribution of *The Grapevine*, gave us a guided tour of the spacious campus, first established way back in 1872.

In addition to the printing atelier, others offer training and work experiences in the fields of pottery, textiles, carpentry, arts and crafts and gastronomy. Many other centres welcome beneficiaries with more complex needs. Some

produce mosaics, others work with animals and plants. Yet other centres cater to the needs of those with more socio-educational needs.

Once a month, three young workers stop what they are doing to produce *The Grapevine*. Several tests are made to ensure the correct quality of the colour covers, then the remaining pages are printed en masse. Currently, some 140 copies are then put in envelopes and mailed to Club members (with a surprising number sent abroad).

On 12 August, we visited Virginia Markus, a young animal activist, who five years ago opened a sanctuary for animals she saved from being slaughtered. Several friendly, big pigs and a few piglets greeted us and let us caress them. Pigs are very clean animals and their pens were absolutely spotless. They always do their business outside and although they love rolling in mud, it is to protect their delicate skin from the sun.

Some of the miniature pigs were shy and Virginia told us they needed time to learn to trust humans after having been treated badly. But they now live a happy, free life being looked after by her. She also saved some rabbits and a beautiful herd of cows and calves, as well as a flock of sheep which were spending the summer on an alp. The sanctuary is situated at 800m altitude in a very peaceful, beautiful setting. An old farmhouse and some stalls are part of it.

Virginia is a very courageous young woman who gives talks in schools and universities about animals and how we treat them. She has also written two books. If you would like to know more about her and her work, just Google: Virginia Markus.
